DDC Pleasure Drives and Special Events for 2011

FOR THE FOLLOWING PLEASURE DRIVES, bring your Coggins original and send a copy to Debi Radtke at enchantment@centurytel.net Make sure you have paid your dues and are a current DDC member! Safety helmets and driving whips are strongly recommended. Bring a lunch unless otherwise indicated. Be prepared to clean up after yourself—including hay and manure! State [trail passes](#) or county trail passes and local fees may be required.

May 7 (Saturday): Safety Clinic. Located at Southwind Ranch, W367S10071 South Rd, Eagle, WI 53119. Information about the driving horse, selecting a harness and vehicle, and a practicum on harnessing, hitching, and learning to drive. Veteran DDC members with well-trained horses are needed as mentors. Contact [Debi Radtke](#) if you can help. Directions: From Interstate 94 - Exit Hwy 67 south to Eagle, left on South Rd, the farm is on the right. [Map](#).

May 15 (Sunday): Black Hawk Drive and Trail Clinic free to DDC members. Back by popular demand, clinician Myrna Rhinehart will give her presentation on trail driving in the log cabin at the lovely Black Hawk Unit of the Lower Wisconsin Riverway. All DDC members may attend for free but you must register in advance with Myrna. The clinic starts at 9 AM with coffee and treats provided. Lots of DDC mentors will be needed (beginning at 10:30 AM) to demonstrate harnessing, hitching and accompany clinic participants. Contact Myrna if you can be a mentor. At 12:15 we will stop for a potluck lunch. We ask that everyone bring a dish to pass and their beverages. Directions: Blackhawk Unit is located approximately 2 miles south of US Hwy 12 on State Rd 78. [Map](#) of the area. Take Wachter Road to the top of the hill. Please park under the large open air pavilion past the log cabin.

June 4 (Saturday): Walking Iron Drive at the County Park in Mazomanie. This drive has nice, wide trails and will also feature a Poker Run just for fun. You will need to get a county trail pass for \$7 through self-registration at the park. Bring your own lunch. Plan to arrive at 10 AM and we will stop at 12:15 and gather together for lunch at 12:30 PM. We can start the afternoon drive at 1:30 PM. Directions: Take US Hwy 14 to Mazomanie. Look for County Rd Y and take north. (From the west this would be a left turn and from the east it would be a right turn.) In the center of the Village of Mazomanie, County Y goes right (becomes Hudson St.) and then left (becomes N. State Street). Continue north on Y and then turn left on Handel Rd which is on the edge of town. Take Handel Rd to Segebrecht Rd. Turn right onto Segebrecht and follow to the end. This is the horse trail entrance to the park.

July 9 (Saturday): Donald Park Drive and Cookout near Mt. Horeb. Another Dane County Park with well-groomed trails. Even in July, this unglaciated land is well-drained and has few mosquitos. Plan to arrive at 10 AM. We will stop at 12:15 and gather around the parking area for lunch. Bring your beverage and food, including something for the grill. Directions: From US Hwy 18 & 151, take County Rd J going south. Turn right at County Rd G, stay on G and the horse parking area is just past tiny Mt. Vernon.

August 14 (Sunday): Menomonee Park, Villages of Lannon and Menomonee Falls. There is a special area dedicated for horse trailers and there are miles of horse trails in the park. There is an entrance fee of \$5 per vehicle payable on site. Address: W220 N7884 Townline Rd, Menomonee Falls WI 53051. **Directions:** From the North, take I-41 or I-45 south. About 1 ½ mile after I-45 & 41 merge, take State Rd 167 (Holy Hill) west about ½ mile to State Rd 175. Turn left on State Hwy 175 and continue in a southeasterly direction about 3 miles to Lannon Rd. Turn right on Lannon Rd. and go in a southerly direction for about 2 miles. Turn right on Menomonee Ave. and go west 1 mile, and then turn left on Town Line Rd to the park entrance and bridal trail. From the West: Take I-94 east. Just past the State Rd 164 and County Rd J turn off is the County Rd F turn off. Take the County Rd F turn off north. It soon becomes State Rd 74 and goes to Sussex. In Sussex, State Rd 74 turns right (Main Street) and after about 1 mile turns left (Town Line Rd). Stay on Town Line Rd and go due north for about 2 miles. The park entrance is on the right. From the South: Figure out the best way to get to State Rd 74 and the Village of Sussex. In Sussex, State Rd 74 turns right (Main Street) and after about 1 mile turns left (Town Line Rd). Stay on Town Line Rd and go due north for about 2 miles. The park entrance is on the right.

October 2 (Sunday): Harry Radtke Memorial Drive, Port Washington. This drive in honor of long time DDC member Harry Radtke will be held at a favorite spot, the lovely farms of the Didier Family. Bring something for the chili dump lunch. This drive has it all – lovely scenic trails, a bridge and water crossing, some old hazards from the American Heritage CDE for you to try if you wish, plus an area for practicing dressage and cones. Our thanks to Pat and Pete Didier for all the preparations they make for this event. **Directions:** Take I-43 to the State Hwy 32 turn off. Instead of going into Port Washington, take County Road H north. Almost immediately after crossing the bridge, you will see County Rd KW. (H and KW form a “Y.”) Take KW north and drive about 1.8 miles. There are Didier Farms on both sides of the road. Take the driveway on the right and continue right past the older farm house, other buildings, barns, and park in a field designated for that purpose.

Andy Halbach's Fifty Years With Equines of All Sizes

Andy Halbach and his three brothers grew up in the shadow of the Circus World Museum in Baraboo, Wisconsin. They assumed all horses trotted around in circles with people standing and doing tricks on their backs. Then they saw the movie, "Ben Hur" and tried jumping the road curbs while their pony was hitched to the cart and actually got some air. Andy was only two years-old when his dad who had grown up with a black Shetland pony, bought a black Shetland pony for his boys. But the pony was a biter that only Andy really stuck with and eventually cured of that habit.

Andy's dad, Richard Halbach, was the Sauk County 4-H Agent and Andy was enrolled in that program early on. In high school, Andy won an Arabian horse donated to the 4-H by Pete Teelin of Teelin Plastics in Baraboo. This horse sparked Andy's interest in the Arabian show circuit.

Andy was always sure he would attend college. He went to UW-River Falls, majoring in agricultural education and minoring in animal science-equines. During summers he was a tour guide at Wisconsin Dells, driving a team of draft horses put to a wagon, through Lost Canyon where he sold lots of postcard souvenirs to help pay for college. After graduating, he taught school for several years and then got the job of 4-H and Youth Agent at Marquette County. He worked towards and got a master's degree in agricultural education and went back to teaching agriculture at the high school level. Over the years he taught at Berlin, Portage and Wisconsin Dells.

In 1993, Andy won a National Science Foundation grant that allowed him to receive special training in bio-technology at River Falls. Then he was able to teach classes in bio-technology to his high school students. Other opportunities included serving as a liaison to Promega in Fitchburg and getting an invitation to see Gene the Bull cloned from mature stem cells. Some of his former students in his bio-technology class now work in the state crime lab and in the bio-tech field.

Andy met his wife Donna when she was riding her horse in River Falls one day. They have two boys, Justin, who is now a purchasing agent, and Nathan who just graduated from UW-River Falls and works for Genex. For quite a few years, Andy and Donna showed Arabs, Half Arabs, Morgans, and a Saddlebred at class A shows. "I am back with ponies so I have gone full circle," Andy remarked.

Andy has been a county fair accredited horse judge since 1974 and is a firm believer in education. "I think it is important to give credit to those who apply what they have learned and do their best," he said. This year he will judge the draft horse show at the Jackson County Fair in Black River Falls.

In addition to being a long time Dairyland member, Andy is also member of the Northwoods Harness Club. "They are such avid sleigh riders – masters of snow!" The next event is scheduled for the Dunn Farm near Hayward where they received another four inches of snow on April 27th. Andy hopes it will soon melt away since his pony does not like snow.

Andy's current show pony, a high stepping Hackney named Excellent Eli, has quite a story behind him. Andy and Donna had sold all their horses and had none for several

years. Then Andy acquired "Famous Amos" who after considerable training actually did make a nice show pony. The young Amish boy who helped Andy train Amos was Rudy Helmuth, youngest brother of the Helmuth clan renown for being horse whisperers. Rudy, being short, specialized in working with ponies, and according to Andy, was very talented. One day, Andy got a call from Rudy who was attending the big horse auction at Kalona, Iowa. "Andy, there is a pony in the killer pen that I think you would like," said Rudy. Andy trusted Rudy's judgment and told him to buy the little horse that was in miserable shape but seemed to have potential. In two months, Andy came to pick up the horse that the Helmuths had named "Elijah" because "he came back from the dead." Even after two months of much better care, the pony did not look very good and Andy wondered if he had made a big mistake. But he put the pony in his trailer and started home. As Andy headed down the hill toward Prairie du Chien, he saw there was an accident ahead. A horse trailer was flipped over. Andy stopped and was told an injured Shetland pony needed to be taken to the vet in Prairie du Chien. Andy agreed to do so. He was at the veterinarian's clinic and soon a little boy ran to him, gave him a hug and said, "You saved Angel!" Because he had to pick up his scraggly Hackney pony, he had saved Angel. No doubt a good omen!

Eli had problems from being abused by humans but with Andy's fifty years of horse experience, he was able to deal with them. Now Eli runs to greet Andy and tries hard to please him. "Eli is smarter than some of my high school students!" remarked the former teacher. After 21 shows, Eli and Andy have amassed 55 blue ribbons. Eli's savior Rudy left the Amish sect and now shows teams in Arizona. He and Andy are Facebook friends. Back when Andy was in the Arab show circuit, Mary Ruth Marks told him about Dairyland Driving Club. She said the club is filled with great people you will want to get to know. Andy found this to be true and he especially enjoys the visiting at annual meetings. Andy is also impressed with the folks who do lots of driving and really keep their horse busy.

Andy has already proven to be an asset to Dairyland by serving as Parliamentarian and he has suggested some interesting Historian projects he would like to pursue. We welcome Andy Halbach to the Dairyland Driving Club Board of Directors.





This free Trail Drive Clinic is an opportunity for DDC members who are not experienced with trail driving to learn how to be safe on the trails and other recreational driving places.

A visual, interactive presentation will be given covering how to prepare, what to bring and how to deal with various situations. Handouts will be available and questions are encouraged. There will be some picnic tables available, but please bring a chair for the clinic if you so desire.

After the presentation, experienced drivers and horses will be paired with less experienced drivers to learn on the trail by demonstration or perhaps some hands-on driving if the experienced driver so deems. You must bring an ASTM/SEI certified equestrian helmet for your own protection and to satisfy our insurance carrier. Those who are participating in the clinic will ride with their more experienced DDC mentor whose horses will be used.

****Mentors are needed for the clinic.** Last year, mentors expressed *tremendous gratification* in mentoring newer drivers! All you need to do in order to be a mentor is tell other people what you are doing when you do it! That's it! No teaching experience necessary! Less experienced drivers are extremely grateful for the opportunity to learn and see how it is done!

For lunch, please bring a **dish to pass**, place setting, and beverage. We encourage everyone to interact with new members during lunch.



“Reservations” are encouraged, as we need to know how many learners to expect, to make sure we have enough mentors and horses.

Experienced DDC members NOT acting as mentors for trail clinic participants are welcomed to attend the pleasure drive just as they normally do.


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
